## MAHWAH'S FLEET KEEPS MAHWAH MOVING

The Township continues modernization of its vehicle fleet. This year the Township replaced Fire Company No. 2's 1993 Pumper Truck with a new 2015 Pierce Arrow Pumper Truck. The DPW and Water and Sewer Department's aging heavy equipment fleet is being upgraded with new, more efficient equipment, including heavy duty dump trucks with plows, and a heavy duty pick-up truck with a hook lift for leaf collection. The Police Department's annual patrol vehicle upgrade includes four SUV patrol vehicles plus a Polaris X900 ATV for pro-active off road rescue and patrol. ■

Our municipal taxes are one of the lowest in Bergen County, and we have been able to maintain our AAA bond rating with Standard & Poor's and Moody's.

There are 591 operating school districts in New Jersey and Mahwah ranks 65th. A high ranking indicates that our Township has great schools with exceptional teachers.

We also take care of our seniors. Our Senior Center offers our senior residents a wide variety of activities, including field trips, dancing, art classes, and book clubs just to name a few.

Our Access Transportation Department provides van service for senior citizens, people with disabilities and other residents unable to drive to doctor appointments and local necessity shopping.

Our infrastructure is continually being monitored and updated by our Department of Public Works and Water and Sewer Department. Working together with Federal, State, County and the Township, total road improvement projects accounted to 10 million dollars, the largest amount of improvements in decades.

Our Special Needs Housing project located on Ramapo Valley Road is under construction and should be completed by spring of 2016.

We have more parkland than any other municipality in Bergen County, and our recreation facilities offer our residents both young and old a wide range of activities. We are sensitive to our surroundings and are actively seeking more ways to maintain and create our parkland setting, and by doing so, we have achieved the Sustainable New Jersey Bronze Award.

## UPDATES FROM THE MUNICIPAL CLERK'S OFFICE

### 2016 Dog and Cat Licensing

The Township Code requires dogs and cats over 7 months of age be licensed.

A Rabies Vaccination Certificate, valid through and including November 1, 2016, is required. If applicable, written proof of spaying or neutering from a licensed Veterinarian is required. If the dog or cat has previously been licensed and the Municipal Clerk's Office has a Rabies Vaccination Certificate valid through and including November 1, 2016 and if applicable, proof of Spaying or Neutering resubmission of documents is not necessary.

### Dog and Cat License Fees:

\$7.00 Spayed/Neutered Dog and/or Cat

\$10.00 Unspayed/Unneutered Dog and/or Cat

After February 15, 2016, a \$10.00 late fee per animal is imposed which is in addition to the licensing fee.

Licenses may be renewed in person between the hours of 8:30 a.m. and 3:30 p.m., Monday through Friday except Municipal holidays in the Municipal Clerk's Office or by mailing the Rabies Vaccination Certificate, Proof of Spaying/Neutering Certificate and a self-addressed stamped envelope to the Township of Mahwah, 475 Corporate Drive, Mahwah, New Jersey Attention: Municipal Clerk's Office. Please do not send cash. If licensing cats and dogs, separate checks are necessary.

**Cut it and leave it!** During the growing season, April through October, grass clippings can account for as much as one-third of the residential solid waste stream in Bergen County. A 5,000 square foot lawn will produce one ton (2,000 pounds) of grass clippings. By just "cutting it and leaving it" you're letting nature do the recycling for you. To maintain your lawn properly, do not cut more than the top third of your lawn so the small clippings will filter down to the soil. The clippings provide a natural fertilizer, and the tall grass will shade the soil and cool the grass roots, resulting in a healthier lawn. Clippings can be use around plantings to moderate soil temperature and weed growth, they can be mixed with your backyard leaf compost pile or can be mixed directly into garden soil to add valuable organic material.

# SOLUTIONS TO STORMWATER POLLUTION

## Easy Things You Can Do Every Day To Protect Our Water

### A Guide to Healthy Habits for Cleaner Water

Pollution on streets, parking lots and lawns is washed by rain into storm drains, then directly to our drinking water supplies and the ocean and lakes our children play in. Fertilizer, oil, pesticides, detergents, pet waste, grass clippings; You name it and it ends up in our water.

Stormwater pollution is one of New Jersey's greatest threats to clean and plentiful water, and that's why we're all doing something about it.

By sharing the responsibility and making small, easy changes in our daily lives, we can keep common pollutants out of stormwater. It all adds up to a cleaner water, and it saves the high costs of cleaning up once it's dirty.

As part of New Jersey's initiative to keep our water clean and plentiful and to meet federal requirements, many municipalities and other public agencies including colleges and military bases must adopt ordinances or other rules prohibiting various activities that contribute to stormwater pollution. Breaking these rules can result in fines and other penalties.

As a resident, business, or other member of the New Jersey community, it is important to know these easy things you can do every day to help protect our water.

### Limit your use of fertilizers and pesticides

- Do a soil test to see if you need a fertilizer.
- Do not apply fertilizers if heavy rain is expected.
- Look into alternatives for pesticides.
- Maintain a small lawn and keep the rest of your property or yard in a natural state with trees and other native vegetation that require little or no fertilizer.
- If you use fertilizers and pesticides, follow the instructions on the label on how to correctly apply it. Make sure you properly store or discard any unused portions.

### Properly use and dispose of hazardous products

- Hazardous products include some household or commercial cleaning products, lawn and garden care products, motor oil, antifreeze, and paints.
- Do not pour any hazardous products down a storm drain because storm drains are usually connected to local waterbodies and the water is not treated.
- If you have hazardous products in your home or workplace, make sure you store or dispose of them properly. Read the label for guidance.
- Use natural or less toxic alternatives when possible.
- Recycle used motor oil.
- Contact your municipality, county or facility management office for the locations of hazardous waste disposal facilities.

### Keep pollution out of storm drains

- Municipalities and many other public agencies are required to mark certain storm drain inlets with messages reminding people that storm drains are connected to local waterbodies

- Do not let sewage or other wastes flow into a stormwater system.

### Clean up after your pet

- Many municipalities and other public agencies must enact and enforce local pet waste rules.
- An example is requiring pet owners or their keepers to pick up and properly dispose of pet waste dropped on public or other people's property.
- Make sure you know your town's or agency's requirements and comply with them. It's the law. And remember to:
  - Use newspapers, bags or pooper-scoopers to pick up wastes.
  - Dispose of wrapped pet waste in the trash or unwrapped in a toilet.
  - Never discard pet waste in a storm drain.

### Don't feed wildlife

- Do not feed wildlife, such as ducks and geese, in public areas.
- Many municipalities and other public agencies must enact and enforce a rule that prohibits wildlife feeding in these areas.

### Don't Litter

- Place litter in trash receptacles.
- Recycle. Recycle. Recycle.
- Participate in community cleanups.

### Dispose of yard waste properly

- Keep leaves and grass out of storm drains.
- If your municipality or agency has yard waste collection rules, follow them.
- Use leaves and grass clippings as a resource for compost.
- Use a mulching mower that recycles grass clippings into the lawn.

# MAHWAH ENVIRONMENTAL COMMISSION ACHIEVES OBJECTIVE FOR 2015

## Mahwah Certified a Sustainable Community

In a true community effort, the Environmental Commission achieved one of its objectives for 2015. The Township has qualified as a sustainable community under the Sustainable Jersey program. Sustainable Jersey is a certification program for New Jersey municipalities that want to go green, save money and take steps to sustain their quality of life over the long term.

Few contest the benefits of clean air, fresh water, waterways filled with fish, garbage in its proper place, clean energy options, parks and open space and a healthy place to work and live. The big question is how do we achieve this as a state? This program provides a framework for municipalities to follow to become more sustainable.

Last year, the Environmental Commission set a goal to achieve this certification. The Commission enlisted the expertise of Sustainability consultant and Mahwah resident, Karin LaGreca to lead the effort. The Commission members all volunteered to take on individual projects. Our Sustainable Mahwah team, the Town Council, the Planning Board, the Department of Public Works (DPW), Mayor Laforet, our Administrative Office staff under Brian Campion, several community groups and individual citizens all contributed toward reaching our goal. Thanks to their efforts, we will become one of a select group of municipalities in New Jersey to achieve this certification.

In order to qualify for certification, the municipality must focus on people, prosperity and the planet to align its actions with the community's values while saving the resources of both town and nature. Throughout the process, we strived to implement practices that lead to cost savings in energy, water and garbage bills. The program helps communities improve efficiency, cut waste and stimulate their local economies. Registered towns get special priority access and notification of incentives and grants.

Some of the actions that qualified Mahwah for points included:

- 1) An Energy Audit was conducted by our Library Trustees and employees that highlighted several improvements to save energy costs.
- 2) The Planning Board updated the Master Plan that included a Natural Resource Inventory that identified resources that make our community special.
- 3) The Environmental Commission completed a Flooding Risk Assessment. The review helps the town assess its preparedness for potential flooding risks and could help qualify town

residents for lower insurance rates in future years.

- 4) The Mayor signed a Town Wellness Pledge and we organized the first Mahwah Wellness/Green Fair in March 2015. Mahwah Environmental Volunteer Organization's (MEVO) creation of a community farm in Campgaw was highlighted at the fair and the Senior Center's wellness activities earned us additional points.

5) The DPW runs our recycling center and their efforts in collecting newspapers, magazines, cardboard and glass, aluminum and plastic containers provide significant cost savings to the town each year. Our town also recycles appliances, metals, and miscellaneous paper. It also coordinates special paper shredding days to help residents securely destroy important documents.

This achievement was important, but the Environmental Commission is not done. Some of the future actions could include:

- A) Improving our water ordinance to increase conservation efforts and help us achieve a primary Master Plan Sustainability Objective.
- B) Designing, funding and creating an extensive Bike/Walk/Hiking trail system throughout to connect the entire town. As we live in a vast community, one way to reduce automotive use to the town's public transportation, local businesses, schools, and recreation facilities is to give residents a safe and enjoyable way to move throughout the community.
- C) Continuing to make community residents and businesses aware of issues that impact the future sustainability of our town – i.e. reducing emissions from idling vehicles at local business and schools; new technologies to reduce energy use; waste management efforts such as MEVO's constant clean-ups in Stag Hill; increasing recycling to further reduce town costs; installing rain gardens to filter runoff into our water systems; and emphasizing the benefits of composting and grass cut it and leave it actions.

# Sustainable Community Farm In Mahwah!

Did you know a sustainable farm is being built in Mahwah? Yes, that's right! The Mahwah Environmental Volunteers Organization (MEVO) has been building a community farm at Campgaw Mountain Reservation located at 200 Campgaw Road. Three years of planning, great partnerships and hundreds of volunteers over the last 6 months and here we are!! The MEVO community farm at Campgaw Reservation is growing into an amazing two acre space for sustainability education and community social change in Northern New Jersey.



MEVO, in partnership with the Bergen County Department of Parks, understands the value of locally grown food and the need for hands on educational programming. Working in partnership with the Township of Mahwah, The Mahwah Department of Public Works, corpo-



rate sponsors and our awesome MEVO volunteers, this vision has

become a reality. Our farm is a learning laboratory where visitors not only learn about how to grow their own food, but also ecosystem services, composting, pollination, environmental stewardship and civic responsibility.

MEVO's Educational Farm has been open since April 2015. The summer intern staff at the farm has been busy educating residents, students and corporate groups all summer long. Whether it is a volunteer or school group, every visitor leaves with gained knowledge and hands on experience of sustainable agriculture methods. Over 1000 people of all ages and abilities have visited or worked on the farm where they have learned about honey bees, composting, sustainable agriculture and the benefits of growing and eating local foods and more!!! ## Curb Water Usage By Making A Few Changes

Are you watching your water usage? Water usage in the average U.S. household taps about 255 gallons per day. Outdoor watering accounts for almost 30 percent of water use, according to an analysis published by Environment Magazine in its July-August 2014 issue. Toilets use 19 %, washers 15%, showers 15%, faucets 11%, leaks 10%, baths 1% and dishwashers 1%. According to a survey conducted by Environmental Magazine the following are some helpful tips on how to minimize your water usage environmental footprint.

By replacing standard toilets with WaterSense labeled toilets you save 18.6%, or reduce daily toilet flushes by 25% and you save 7.3% water. Replacing clothes washer with an ENERGY STAR labeled washer saves 16.7% or only wash a full load of clothes or adjust water level in washer to match load size and your save 7.9%. Replacing standard showerheads with WaterSense labeled showerheads saves 1.9%, but taking shorter showers (5 minutes instead of 8.2 minutes) saves 7.9%. Installing WaterSense labeled faucets saves 5.4% or reduce the amount of time the faucet is left running by 2 minutes per person per day saves 4.4%. Washing dirty dishes in an ENERGY STAR labeled dishwasher saves 2.2% or not pre-rinsing dishes before putting in the dishwasher saves 0.4%. Filling the tub half way when taking a bath saves 0.3%. Watering all outdoor plants in the morning saves 40%, manually watering turf-grass with a hose saves 33%, and by replacing most outdoor turf and plants with water-wise landscaping and irrigating only as much as is needed can save from 20-100%.

# Reminders from the Mahwah Green Team

The Mahwah Green Team hopes you had a wonderful summer and have enjoyed our wonderful New Jersey beaches. However, did you know that litter in Mahwah reaches those wonderful beaches and pollutes our oceans and its wildlife? Most plastic pollution at sea starts out on land as litter on beaches, streets and sidewalks. Rain or overwatering flushes that litter through a storm drain system or directly to creeks, streams and rivers that lead to the ocean. After plastics enter the marine environment they slowly photodegrade into smaller pieces that marine life can mistake for food, sometimes with fatal results. And don't forget humans eat the fish from the ocean which have eaten our plastic pollution. Everything is connected and that is why the Green Team encourages all Mahwah residents to be mindful of litter. Let's keep Mahwah and our oceans clean and healthy for all living things today and in the future!

The Mahwah Green Team wants to remind residents that according to the New Jersey Department of Environmental Protection Agency and pursuant to New Jersey Administrative Code § 7:27-15.8 Idle standard (a) No person shall cause, suffer, allow, or permit the engine of a gasoline-fueled motor vehicle to idle for more than three consecutive minutes if the vehicle is not in motion. Stopping unnecessary vehicle idling is one relatively easy way to contribute to improved air quality and respiratory health in our community. Idling creates pollution and wastes money. Idling releases hazardous particulate matter into the air which leads to asthma and other health problems, especially in children. Two minutes of idling uses the same amount of gas as driving 1 mile. Please be mindful and turn off your engine whenever possible.

The Mahwah Green Team wants to remind you that our public parks and recreation facilities are smoke free to protect public health. Keeping our public parks and recreation facilities smoke free reduces the exposure of children to second hand smoke, reduces the visibility of tobacco use to children, and reduces litter. Cigarette butts are the most littered item in the United States, so please help us to keep our air, land, water and children safe so Mahwah can continue to be a healthy place to grow! ■

## Ramsey Journal and the Dater Family

It has been said that a newspaper is the “first rough draft of history.” The Ramsey Journal, established by John Y. Dater II in 1892, presented news and views of interest to the people of Northwest Bergen County.

For 75 years, until the paper was sold in 1967, three generations of the Dater family chronicled the births, deaths and marriages; triumphs and defeats; trials and public controversies, and all kinds of interesting things about the communities it served.



In an exciting period of time that spanned five wars, a great depression and the rapid post-war suburbanization of Bergen County, the editors and publishers of The Ramsey Journal preserved the rich first draft of history of Ramsey, Mahwah, Allendale, Upper Saddle River, Saddle River and Waldwick.

The exhibit features a replica of the composing room at the Ramsey Journal Building showing how the paper was composed and printed using the letterpress method invented by Gutenberg in 1450, used by the colonial printers such as Benjamin Franklin, and continued in use well into the 20th century. There are multimedia presentations and a hands on activity for children of all ages about this printing process.

The Dater family has been influential in Hohokus Township history in many ways. Beginning in Sloatsburg in the 18th century, members of the family migrated to Hohokus Township. John Y. Dater (1819-1894) was one of the founders of the village of Ramsey’s Station and for many years Main Street was known as Dater Avenue. He was active in Democratic politics and was a “Peace Democrat” in the New Jersey Senate at the outset of the Civil War. John Y. Dater, II, the founder of The Ramsey Journal, was the grandson of the Senator. In addition to publishing the paper weekly, John Y. Dater II was a member of the school board, first for Hohokus Township and later for the Borough of Ramsey for 38 years. Dater School in Ramsey is named for him.

John Y. Dater, III (1897-1985) succeeded his father as the editor and publisher of The Ramsey Journal in 1950. He, and later his son, Thomas E. Dater published the paper until 1967 when it was sold to the Ridgewood News. John Y. Dater III was a founding member of the Mahwah Historical Society that saved and preserved the 1871 railroad station in Mahwah as a museum.

Thomas E. Dater (1920-2013) published a successor paper, The Home and Store News and was active in the Ramsey Fire Department, the Ramsey Library and the First Presbyterian Church. He was also an active member and supporter of the Mahwah Museum.

## Mail on the Move in Northwest Bergen

*Mail on the Move in Northwest Bergen* tells the story of the Colonial and United States Post Offices, as seen in Mahwah since the 1700s. The exhibit presents rare artifacts, such as an 18th century post rider’s saddle and mailbags, authentic Mahwah letters from 1800 to the 1900s, and brass post boxes from the former 1936 Finch Building post office. A concise narrative takes the visitor through the Golden Age of stagecoach travel and mail contracts, the amazing Railway Post Office, RFD service in rural Mahwah, and the modern (present) 1967 post office. Don’t miss this outstanding exhibit!

## Hohokus Township

*Mahwah and Boroughitis in Northwest Bergen* traces the evolution of the Township of Mahwah and the various boroughs that were once part of Hohokus Township starting around 1849. (Hohokus Township changed its name to the Township of Mahwah in 1944.) Various maps, newspaper clippings from the Ramsey Journal, vintage photos, and other materials from the Museum archives and on loan from others will be displayed.

The Boroughs of Allendale, Saddle River, Upper Saddle River, Ramsey, Ho-Ho-Kus and Waldwick were originally part of Hohokus Township. We will highlight the reasons that the boroughs broke away and sought political independence from the larger Hohokus Township, including issues relating to taxation, school systems and local community improvement. Interesting topics from these six boroughs and the Township of Mahwah will be exhibited as well.

## Historic Preservation Project

Mahwah High School student Michael Delcher, will be refurbishing, and painting the historic Quackenbush Barn, located in Winter Park, as his Eagle Scout Project. Michael approached the Historic Preservation Commission (HPC) in the summer of 2014 inquiring about possible Eagle Scout projects of an historic nature, and we recommended that he repair and paint the Quackenbush Barn. ## OFFICE OF EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT REMINDS US TO BE PREPARED

The Office of Emergency Management would like to remind our residents to be prepared for weather events and disasters. Create an emergency plan and preparedness kit for your family. In the past we spoke generally about hurricanes and summer storms. As the fall approaches we want to change our focus to winter storms. Winter storms can range from a moderate snow over a few hours to a blizzard with blinding, wind-driven snow that lasts for several days. Many winter storms are accompanied by dangerously low temperatures and sometimes by strong winds, icing, sleet and freezing rain. One of the primary concerns is the winter weather's ability to knock out heat, power and communication services to your home or office, sometimes for days at a time.

Preparedness kits should be designed to include any type of emergencies. To adapt your kits for winter storms, remember to make sure the supplies are fresh and add a sleeping bag or warm blanket and a change of warm clothes including winter type shoes for each person.

Before winter arrives, check your supply of ice melt, check shovels and snow removal equipment. Make sure you have an adequate supply of fuel for the

equipment and generators.

Learn how to manually open and close any garage doors, security doors and gates that are electronically operated in case of power failures.

Make sure you winterize your vehicle, keep the following items in the trunk: sand to improve traction, a small shovel, flashlight and warm blanket.

Stay indoors during storms and only travel if necessary.

### Emergency Generator Safety

To prevent carbon monoxide poisoning never use a generator indoors. Only operate a generator outdoors in a well-ventilated, dry area that is away from air intakes to the home and where it is protected from direct exposure to rain and snow, preferably under a canopy, open shed, or carport.

Plug individual appliances into the generator using heavy duty, outdoor rated cords with a wire gauge adequate for the appliance load.

Never plug the generator into a wall outlet. ■

### CERT's Mission



Mahwah Community Emergency Response Team (CERT), and County Animal Response Team (CART), is made up of volunteer residents who are trained to support professional first responders (police, fire, EMTs, et al) in all types of emergency situations while serving the community in other ways during non-emergency times.

### Ongoing Educational Training Courses and Meetings

We welcomed members of the Bergen County Police Bomb Squad who gave a presentation on their Bomb Awareness program. Members of the Mahwah Office of Emergency Management (OEM), Mahwah Fire Department and Allendale CERT team joined our Mahwah CERT team for this presentation.

The National Weather Service conducted a SKYWARN Spotter training class which led us through severe weather safety and reporting instructions. Many of our members attended and were issued 2015 SKYWARN Spotter IDs.



Bryan Enberg, a senior officer with NJ Search & Rescue Team went over their procedures and offered a refresher on the basics of search & rescue.

### Opportunities to Help Our Community

There was a major fire in Mahwah and a number of families were forced to flee from their home. Several of those families were in need of a shelter and the Mahwah CERT team received a call to open a shelter at town hall.

The Bergen County Police requested our assistance with a search and rescue for a missing autistic youth at Campgaw Mountain Reserve who was later found safe at a friend's home in Oakland.

At the completion of the program, basic CERT safety equipment will be issued to each participant. Class size is limited, so early registration is encouraged to insure a place in this class.

The **CART** training course is offered **evenings** at the Bergen Law and Public Safety Institute in Mahwah beginning **Tuesday evening, September 1st** for 9 weeks including a graduation.
